01 From the Desk of LD Veterinary Hospital

August 2026 has been an important month for animal health in Bangladesh. The national discussion moved beyond treatment alone: veterinary education and research, medicine quality, stronger public veterinary infrastructure, humane management of community animals, responsible adoption, vaccination and modern diagnostics all received renewed attention. For **LD Veterinary Hospital & Day Care Limited**, this direction closely reflects our own mission — to make professional, compassionate and preventive veterinary care more accessible to pets, small animals, birds and the families who care for them.

Bangladesh's pet-care culture is also changing rapidly. In urban households, dogs and cats are increasingly treated as family members, while demand is growing for qualified veterinarians, diagnostics, surgery, vaccination, grooming, boarding, emergency support and reliable pet-care products. The opportunity is significant, but so is the responsibility: growth must be matched by clinical standards, animal welfare, ethical breeding and sales, disease prevention, proper medicine use and public awareness.

02 Bangladesh Veterinary Sector — Key August 2026 Developments

1. Veterinary research and global health moved to the centre

The 32nd Annual Scientific Conference of the Bangladesh Society for Veterinary Education and Research (BSVER) was held at Bangladesh Agricultural University from 7–9 August 2026 under the theme "Translating Veterinary Education and Research into Sustainable Livestock Development and Global Health." The conference brought together scientists, academics, veterinarians, policymakers, entrepreneurs and students, with 318 research papers scheduled across 16 scientific sessions. The scale of the programme signals a stronger national focus on evidence-based veterinary practice, food security, animal health and One Health.

2. Specialised veterinary hospitals proposed for every division

During the BSVER conference, the government announced plans to establish a specialised veterinary hospital in every division. This is a major policy direction for Bangladesh: stronger referral facilities can improve advanced diagnostics, surgery, specialist consultation, teaching, disease surveillance and emergency response. For the private veterinary sector, it also creates space for collaboration, referral networks, professional training and complementary services.

3. Quality veterinary medicines received high-level attention

On 27 August, the State Minister for Fisheries and Livestock stressed the need to ensure quality medicines in animal treatment during a visit and exchange meeting at the Central Veterinary Hospital campus. This is especially relevant for companion-animal practice, where safe prescribing, authentic products, correct dosage, antimicrobial stewardship and proper storage are essential for patient safety and public confidence.

4. Veterinary medicine oversight was updated

An Extraordinary Gazette dated 14 August 2026 recorded the reconstitution of the Technical Sub-Committee for Veterinary Medicine under the Drug Control Committee. Regulatory attention to veterinary medicines is important for quality assurance, registration, pharmacovigilance and responsible use across the animal-health sector.

5. Adoption and humane care gained public visibility

A national lifestyle feature published on 20 August encouraged people to "adopt, don't shop," drawing attention to deshi cats and dogs that need safe homes. This reflects a wider shift toward animal welfare and responsible ownership. Adoption should be supported by veterinary screening, vaccination, deworming, sterilisation where appropriate, nutrition advice and follow-up care.

03 The Bigger Pet-Care Picture in Bangladesh

Pet ownership in Bangladesh is becoming more organised and service-oriented, particularly in major cities. Grocery and retail channels now carry wider pet-food selections, veterinary clinics are expanding, and families increasingly budget for routine animal healthcare. This creates a developing ecosystem that includes hospitals and clinics, diagnostics, pharmacies, pet food, grooming, boarding, daycare, accessories, adoption and rescue networks, transport, training and digital services.

- **Preventive healthcare:** vaccination, deworming, parasite control, wellness examinations and nutrition.
- **Clinical care:** internal medicine, dermatology, infectious disease management, dental care and geriatric support.
- **Diagnostics:** blood tests, rapid tests, imaging, pathology and other evidence-based diagnostic services.

- Surgery & reproductive care: spay/neuter, soft-tissue procedures, wound management and postoperative care.
- Emergency & critical care: rapid triage, stabilisation, oxygen/supportive care and referral when needed.
- Pet lifestyle services: grooming, daycare, boarding/hotel care and owner counselling.
- Animal welfare: humane treatment, adoption support, sterilisation and community-animal management.
- Public health: rabies prevention, bite awareness, zoonotic-disease education and One Health collaboration.

04 Rabies Prevention: Every Vaccinated Pet Protects a Community

Rabies remains one of the most important preventable zoonotic diseases. Routine vaccination of dogs and cats, timely booster doses, accurate vaccination records, responsible control of roaming and immediate medical attention after a suspected exposure are core safeguards. LD continues to promote vaccination as both an individual pet-health responsibility and a public-health contribution.

Humane community-dog management is equally important. Recent public discussion in Dhaka has reinforced Catch–Neuter–Vaccinate–Release (CNVR) as a scientific and sustainable approach, while also reminding citizens that cruelty, unnecessary killing, abandonment, and illegal relocation conflict with Bangladesh's animal-welfare framework.

06 August Focus: What Responsible Pet Owners Should Prioritise

1. Keep vaccination and deworming schedules current; maintain written or digital medical records.
2. Do not self-medicate pets with human medicines or unverified veterinary products.
3. Schedule regular wellness checks — early detection is usually safer and less costly than late emergency treatment.
4. Consider spaying/neutering based on veterinary advice and the animal's age, health, and lifestyle.
5. Use species-appropriate nutrition and avoid sudden diet changes without professional guidance.
6. Seek prompt veterinary attention for breathing difficulty, repeated vomiting, seizures, trauma, inability to urinate, severe lethargy or suspected poisoning.
7. Adopt responsibly. Before bringing an animal home, plan for lifetime food, healthcare, vaccination, sterilisation, housing and emergency expenses.
8. Treat community animals humanely and support vaccination/sterilisation-based population management

07 Where Bangladesh's Pet & Veterinary Sector Should Go Next

The next phase of Bangladesh's veterinary development should combine public infrastructure with responsible private investment. The sector needs more specialist training, standardised clinical protocols, stronger diagnostic capacity, reliable veterinary medicines, modern referral systems, animal blood-bank and critical-care capacity, digital patient records, better pet-owner education and stronger collaboration between universities, government, private hospitals and animal-welfare organisations.

One Health must remain central. The health of animals, people and the environment is interconnected — particularly in rabies, antimicrobial resistance, food safety and emerging zoonotic disease. Veterinary hospitals therefore serve not only individual animals; they are part of the wider public-health system.
